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# UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 (HMO D-SNP) 2024 *List of Covered Drugs* (Formulary)

## Introduction

This document is called the *List of Covered Drugs* (also known as the Drug List). It tells you which prescription drugs and over-the-counter (OTC) drugs are covered by UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001. The Drug List also tells you if there are any special rules or restrictions on any drugs covered by UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001. Key terms and their definitions appear in the last chapter of the *Evidence of Coverage*.

**Important Message About What You Pay for Vaccines** – Some vaccines are considered medical benefits. Other vaccines are considered Part D drugs. Our plan covers Part D vaccines at no cost to you. Call Customer Service for more information.

Our contact information, along with the date we last updated the Drug List, appears on the front and back covers of this document.

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## A. Disclaimers

This is a list of drugs that members can get in UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001.

- ❖ UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 (HMO D-SNP) is a Dual Eligible Special Needs Plan (D-SNP) with a Medicare contract and a contract with the New Jersey Medicaid program. Enrollment in UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 (HMO D-SNP) depends on contract renewal. This plan is available to anyone who has both Medicare and full New Jersey Medicaid benefits.

Members must use network plan providers, pharmacies, DME (Durable Medical Equipment) suppliers, and follow the rules on referrals. Members will be enrolled into Medicare Part D prescription drug coverage under the plan and will be automatically disenrolled from any other Medicare Advantage or Medicare Part D prescription drug coverage.

- ❖ The Drug List (formulary) may change on January 1 of each year, and from time to time during the plan year. You will receive notice when necessary.

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## B. Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)

Find answers to questions you have about this *List of Covered Drugs*. You can read all of the FAQ to learn more or look for a question and answer.

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### B1. What prescription drugs are on the *List of Covered Drugs*? (We call the *List of Covered Drugs* the “Drug List” for short.)

The drugs on the Drug List that starts on page 12 are the drugs covered by UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001. These drugs are available at pharmacies within our network. A pharmacy is in our network if we have an agreement with them to work with us and provide you services. We refer to these pharmacies as “network pharmacies.”

- UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 will cover all medically necessary drugs on the Drug List if:
  - Your doctor or other prescriber says you need them to get better or stay healthy, **and**
  - You fill the prescription at a UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 network pharmacy.
- UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 may have additional steps to access certain drugs. Refer to question B4 for more information.

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### B2. Does the Drug List ever change?

Yes, and UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 must follow Medicare and Medicaid rules when making changes. We may add or remove drugs on the Drug List during the year.

We may also change our rules about drugs. For example, we could:

- Decide to require or not require prior authorization for a drug. (Prior authorization is permission from UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 before you can get a drug.)
- Add or change the amount of a drug you can get (called quantity limits).
- Add or change step therapy restrictions on a drug. (Step therapy means you must try one drug before we will cover another drug.)

For more information on these drug rules, refer to question B4.

If you are taking a drug that was covered at the **beginning** of the year, we will generally not remove or change coverage of that drug **during the rest of the year** unless:

- A new, cheaper drug comes on the market that works as well as a drug on the Drug List now, **or**
- We learn that a drug is not safe, **or**
- A drug is removed from the market.

Questions B3 and B6 have more information on what happens when the Drug List changes.

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### **B3. What happens when there is a change to the Drug List?**

Some changes to the Drug List will happen **immediately**. For example:

- **A new generic drug becomes available.** Sometimes, a new generic drug comes on the market that works as well as a brand name drug on the Drug List now. When that happens, we may remove the brand name drug and add the new generic drug. When we add the new generic drug, we may also decide to keep the brand name drug on the list but change its coverage rules or limits.
  - We may not tell you before we make this change, but we will send you information about the specific change we made once it happens.
  - You or your provider can ask for an exception from these changes. We will send you a notice with the steps you can take to ask for an exception. Refer to questions B10 - B12 for more information on exceptions.
- **A drug is taken off the market.** If the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) says a drug you are taking is not safe or the drug's manufacturer takes a drug off the market, we will take it off the Drug List. If you are taking the drug, we will let you know. Contact your doctor or other prescriber and ask about your other options.

**We may make other changes that affect the drugs you take.** We will tell you in advance about these other changes to the Drug List. These changes might happen if:

- The FDA provides new guidance or there are new clinical guidelines about a drug.
- We add a generic drug that is not new to the market **and**
- Replace a brand name drug currently on the Drug List **or**
- Change the coverage rules or limits for the brand name drug.

When these changes happen, we will:

- Tell you at least 30 days before we make the change to the Drug List **or**
- Let you know and give you a 30-day supply of the drug after you ask for a refill.

This will give you time to talk to your doctor or other prescriber. They can help you decide:

- If there is a similar drug on the Drug List you can take instead **or**
- Whether to ask for an exception from these changes. To learn more about exceptions, refer to questions B10 - B12 for more information.

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#### **B4. Are there any restrictions or limits on drug coverage or any required actions to take to get certain drugs?**

Yes. Some drugs have coverage rules or have limits on the amount you can get. In some cases, you, your doctor, or other prescriber must do something before you can get the drug. For example:

- **Prior authorization:** For some drugs, you, your doctor, or other prescriber must get authorization from UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 before you fill your prescription. Prior authorization is different from a referral. UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 may not cover the drug if you don't get authorization.
- **Quantity limits:** Sometimes UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 limits the amount of a drug you can get.
- **Step therapy:** Sometimes UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 requires you to do step therapy. This means you will have to try drugs in a certain order for your medical condition. You might have to try one drug before we will cover another drug. If your doctor or other prescriber thinks the first drug doesn't work for you, then we will cover the second.

You can find out if your drug has any additional requirements or limits by looking in the tables on pages 14 - 214. You can also get more information by visiting our website at [myuhc.com/communityplan](http://myuhc.com/communityplan). We have posted online documents that explain our prior authorization and step therapy restrictions. You may also ask us to send you a copy.

You can ask for an exception to these limits. This will give you time to talk to your doctor or other prescriber. They can help you decide if there is a similar drug on the Drug List you can take instead or whether to ask for an exception. Refer to questions B10 - B12 for more information about exceptions.

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#### **B5. How will I know if the drug I want has limits or if there are any actions required to get the drug?**

The table of drugs on pages 14 - 214 has a column labeled "Necessary actions, restrictions, or limits on use."

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**B6. What happens if UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 changes their rules about how they cover some drugs (for example, prior authorization, quantity limits, and/or step therapy restrictions)?**

In some cases, we will tell you in advance if we add or change prior authorization, quantity limits, and/or step therapy restrictions on a drug. Refer to question B3 for more information about this advance notice and situations where we may not be able to tell you in advance when our rules about drugs on the Drug List change.

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**B7. How can I find a drug on the Drug List?**

There are two ways to find a drug:

- You can search alphabetically by the drug's name, **or**
- You can search by drug type.

To search **alphabetically**, use the Index of Covered Drugs section. You can find it on page 250. The Index of Covered Drugs is an alphabetical list of all of the drugs included in the Drug List. Brand name drugs and generic drugs are listed in the index. Look in the Index and find your drug. Next to your drug, you will see the page number where you can find coverage information.

To search **by drug type**, find the section labeled "List of Drugs by Drug Type" on page 12. The drugs in this section are grouped into categories by type. For example, if you are taking a medicine for migraines, you should look in the "Antimigraine Agents" category. That is where you will find drugs that treat migraines.

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**B8. What if the drug I want to take is not on the Drug List?**

If you don't find your drug on the Drug List, call Customer Service at **1-800-514-4911**, TTY **711** and ask about it. If you learn that UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 will not cover the drug, you can do one of these things:

- Ask Customer Service for a list of drugs like the one you want to take. Then show the list to your doctor or other prescriber. They can prescribe a drug on the Drug List that is like the one you want to take. **Or**
- You can ask the health plan to make an exception to cover your drug. Refer to questions B10 - B12 for more information about exceptions.

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**B9. What if I am a new UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 member and can't find my drug on the Drug List or have a problem getting my drug?**

We can help. We may cover a temporary 30-day supply of your drug during the first 90 days you are a member of UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001. This will give you time to talk to your doctor or other

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prescriber. They can help you decide if there is a similar drug on the Drug List you can take instead, or whether to ask for an exception.

If your prescription is written for fewer days, we will allow multiple refills to provide up to a maximum of 30 days of medication.

We will cover a 30-day supply of your drug if:

- You are taking a drug that is not on our Drug List, **or**
- Health plan rules do not let you get the amount ordered by your prescriber, **or**
- The drug requires prior authorization by UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001, **or**
- You are taking a drug that is part of a step therapy restriction.

If you are in a nursing home or other long-term care facility and need a drug that is not on the Drug List or if you cannot easily get the drug you need, we can help. If you have been in the plan for more than 90 days, live in a long-term care facility, and need a supply right away:

- We will cover one 31-day supply of the drug you need (unless you have a prescription for fewer days), whether or not you are a new UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 member.
- This is in addition to the temporary supply during the first 90 days you are a member of UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001.

If you are going through a change in your level of care, such as being transferred from a hospital to a long-term care facility, any time during the year, we may cover a temporary 31-day supply of the drug you need. This will give you time to talk to your doctor or other prescriber about other treatment options or to try to get an exception. Refer to questions B10 - B12 for more information about exceptions.

We will not pay for more of your drug after you get a temporary supply unless you receive authorization from the plan.

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## **B10. Can I ask for an exception to cover my drug?**

Yes. You can ask UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 to make an exception to cover a drug that is not on the Drug List.

You can also ask us to change the rules on your drug.

- For example, UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 may limit the amount of a drug we will cover. If your drug has a limit, you can ask us to change the limit and cover more.
- Other examples: You can ask us to drop step therapy restrictions or prior authorization requirements.

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**B11. How can I ask for an exception?**

To ask for an exception, call Customer Service. A Customer Service representative will work with you and your provider to help you ask for an exception. You can also read Chapter 9 of the *Evidence of Coverage* to learn more about exceptions.

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**B12. How long does it take to get an exception?**

After we get a statement from your prescriber supporting your request for an exception, we will give you a decision within 72 hours. Your doctor or other prescriber can fax or mail the statement to us. Or your doctor or other prescriber can tell us on the phone, and then fax or mail the statement. If you have questions, call Customer Service at **1-800-514-4911**, TTY **711**.

If you or your prescriber think your health may be harmed if you have to wait 72 hours for a decision, you can ask for an expedited exception. This is a faster decision. If your prescriber supports your request, we will give you a decision within 24 hours of getting your prescriber's supporting statement.

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**B13. What are generic drugs?**

Generic drugs are made up of the same active ingredients as brand name drugs. They usually cost less than the brand name drug and usually don't have well-known names. Generic drugs are approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA).

UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 covers both brand name drugs and generic drugs.

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**B14. What are over-the-counter (OTC) drugs?**

OTC stands for "over-the-counter." UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 offers some OTC drugs through the NJ FamilyCare (Medicaid) portion of the plan's coverage at no cost to you. You need a prescription for OTC drugs to be covered. These OTC drugs are listed in this Drug List.

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**B15. Does UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 cover non-drug OTC products?**

Yes. UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 covers **some** non-drug OTC products when they are prescribed for you by your provider. These non-drug OTC products are listed in the Drug List.

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**B16. Can I get a long-term supply of drugs?**

Yes. UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 offers two ways to get a long-term supply of "maintenance" drugs on our plan's Drug List. (Maintenance drugs are drugs that you take on a regular basis, for a chronic or long-term medical condition.)

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- **Retail pharmacy.** Some retail pharmacies in our network allow you to get a long-term supply of maintenance drugs. Your *Provider and Pharmacy Directory* tells you which pharmacies in our network can give you a long-term supply of maintenance drugs.
- **Mail-order.** For certain kinds of drugs, you can use the plan's network mail-order service. Our plan's mail-order service allows you to order a 100-day supply. To get order forms and information about filling your prescriptions by mail, please reference your *Provider and Pharmacy Directory* to find the mail service pharmacies in our network.

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### **B17. What is my copay?**

UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 members have no copays for prescription and over-the-counter (OTC) drugs and non-drug products as long as the member follows the plan's rules. Refer to questions B14 and B15 for more information about OTC drugs and non-drug products.

Tiers are groups of drugs on our Drug List. Your plan has 1 tier named "Covered Drugs." All covered drugs are in this tier.

- Tier 1 Generic drugs have a \$0 copay.
- Tier 1 Brand name drugs have a \$0 copay.
- OTCs have a \$0 copay.

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## **C. Overview of the *List of Covered Drugs***

The *List of Covered Drugs* gives you information about the drugs covered by UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001. If you have trouble finding your drug in the list, turn to the Index of Covered Drugs that begins on page 250. The index alphabetically lists all drugs covered by UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001.

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### **C1. List of Drugs by Drug Type**

The drugs in this section are grouped into categories by type. For example, if you are taking a medicine for migraines, you should look in the “Antimigraine Agents” category. That is where you will find drugs that treat migraines.

The first column of the table lists the name of the drug. Generic drugs are listed in lower-case italics (for example, *simvastatin*), brand name drugs are capitalized (for example, HUMALOG), and OTC drugs and products are listed in lower-case (for example, aspirin). The information in the “Necessary actions, restrictions, or limits on use” column tells you if UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 has any rules for covering your drug.

**Here are the meanings of the codes used in the “Necessary actions, restrictions, or limits on use” column:**

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#### **PA – Prior authorization**

For some drugs, you, your doctor, or other prescriber must get authorization from UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 before you fill your prescription. Prior authorization is different from a referral. UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 may not cover the drug if you don’t get authorization.

#### **QL – Quantity limits**

Sometimes UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 limits the amount of a drug you can get.

#### **ST – Step therapy**

Sometimes UHC Dual Complete NJ-Y001 requires you to do step therapy. This means you will have to try drugs in a certain order for your medical condition. You might have to try one drug before we will cover another drug. If your doctor or other prescriber thinks the first drug doesn’t work for you, then we will cover the second.

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**B/D – Medicare Part B or Part D**

Depending on how this drug is used, it may be covered by either the Medicare Part B (doctor and outpatient health care) or the Medicare Part D (prescription drugs) portion of the plan's coverage. Your doctor may need to provide the plan with more information about how this drug will be used to make sure it's correctly covered.

**LA – Limited access**

Drugs are considered "limited access" if the FDA says the drug can be given out only by certain facilities or doctors. These drugs may require extra handling, provider coordination or patient education that can't be done at a network pharmacy.

**MME – Morphine milligram equivalent**

Additional quantity limits may apply across all drugs in the opioid class used for the treatment of pain. This additional limit is called a cumulative morphine milligram equivalent (MME) and is designed to monitor safe dosing levels of opioids for individuals who may be taking more than one opioid drug for pain management. If your doctor prescribes more than this amount or thinks the limit is not right for your situation, you or your doctor can ask the plan to cover the additional quantity.

**7D – 7-day limit**

An opioid drug used for the treatment of acute pain may be limited to a 7-day supply for members with no recent history of opioid use. This limit is intended to minimize long-term opioid use. For members who are new to the plan and have a recent history of using opioids, the limit may be overridden by the pharmacy when appropriate.

**DL – Dispensing limit**

Dispensing limits apply to this drug. This drug is limited to a 1-month supply per prescription.
